On a lined sheet of paper, record four open-ended / opinion questions about the assigned pages that you want to discuss with your group. These should be questions that allow for different perspectives and ideas, which can be supported with evidence from the text. Do **NOT** write factual questions (from *The Bean Trees*: Where does Taylor work? or How does Taylor come to have Turtle?). **Write questions about parts of the text that are ambiguous or unclear. If you can find a definite answer in the text, then it is not a good question.** When asking questions about specific scenes, make sure to include context (the situation, setting and characters involved). You will earn **no credit** for questions that could apply to ANY book (How do you like the book? What do you think of the main character?).
